## RE: NOSB Compliance, Accreditation and Certification Committee Agenda item: Calculating Percentage of Organic Ingredients in Multi-ingredient Products

Dear Ms. Arsenault and NOSB,

CCOF thanks the National Organic Standards Board (NOSB) for the opportunity to comment on calculating organic ingredients. We appreciate your consideration of the public comments from the fall 2012 meeting. CCOF supports the nine resulting recommendations of the committee. The proposed regulatory changes, use of self-calculating forms, clarifications about salt, and specification sheets, along with the certifier's responsibility to confirm ingredient percentages, all align with best practices that CCOF and many other certifiers have adopted over the years.

In particular we applaud the acknowledgment that a product might contribute 100% organic content while not meeting the "100% organic" claim requirements, and that unprocessed agricultural products may be assumed to contribute 100% organic content. This recognition will help certifiers avoid a paper chase that adds no value to the system and will reduce the burden of certification on certified operations. The recommendation supports CCOF's Practices Not Paperwork initiative and the Sound and Sensible philosophy of the NOP.

While the development of sample calculation spreadsheets by the NOP might be useful, CCOF would prefer these forms not be required for use by all certifiers. Many certifiers have developed their own forms and should be allowed to continue to use them.

Again, CCOF thanks you for the opportunity to provide our comments, and the Compliance, Accreditation, and Certification Committee for their time and efforts on these complex subjects. We are available to answer any questions you might have about our comments.
